

Hearing and Speech Milestones



	Usual Age	Age Achieved
Laughs and coos. Startles to loud sounds/wakes up to noises	Birth—3 mo	
Smiles when spoken with. Is soothed by mother's voice	1—3 mo	
Begins to turn head or eyes toward voices & sounds. Enjoys sound-making toys	3—6 mo	
Begins to babble, repeating syllables like "ba-ba-ba"	6—12 mo	
Turns toward soft sounds or voices coming from behind	6—12 mo	
Responds to own name and the telephone ringing.	6—12 mo	
Understands "no", "bye-bye"	6—12 mo	
Says 3 words (other than mama and dada)	12—21 mo	
When asked, points to at least 3 body parts.	18—24 mo	
Follows 2 requests ("get the ball and put it on the table")	18—24 mo	
Puts 2 words together (more cookie)	18—24 mo	
Uses 3 word phrases (daddy go bye-bye). Child's speech is 75% understandable	30—36 mo	
Uses complete 5 word sentences.	4—5 yrs	
Child's speech is 90% understandable. Understands most conversation	4—5 yrs
